The Dreaded Asian Carp

There are many species of fish collectively known as Asian carp. Most have been cultivated in China for over 1,000 years, but silver carp is native to and cultivated in Vietnam. Silver carp have become notorious for being easily frightened by boats and personal watercraft, which causes them to leap high into the air. They can jump up 8 to 10 feet and have injured numerous boaters. According to the EPA, “reported injuries include cuts from fins, black eyes, broken bones, back injuries, and concussions.” This behavior also has sometimes been attributed to the very similar bighead carp, but this is untrue. They do not normally jump when frightened.

The current status of Asian carp in the Great Lakes is as follows: A few bighead carp have been captured from Lake Erie, but there is no evidence that they have reproduced there. No bighead carp have been found in any other Great Lake. Grass carp have been captured in every Great Lake except Superior, but there is no evidence of a reproducing population. No silver carp or black carp have yet been found in any Great Lake.

In the United States the term “Asian carp” is often used for only grass, black, silver and bighead carp. They are consid-

ered to be nuisance invasive species. Bighead, silver and grass carp are known to be well-established in the Mississippi River. These fish are thought to be highly detrimental to the environment in the USA. Because of this, a national plan for the management and control of Asian carp was accepted by the National Aquatic Nuisance Species Task Force in 2007.

There has been a dramatic rise in the populations of bighead and silver carp in the Mississippi River. They feed by filtering plankton from the water, competing with native species for food and living space. Because of this, they are difficult to capture by normal fishing methods.

The Dreaded Asian Carp

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is concerned about the possibility of Asian carp migrating to the Great Lakes. In 2002, the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers completed an electric fish barrier in the Chicago Sanitary and Ship Canal, the only aquatic link between the Great Lakes and the Mississippi River. In November of 2009 carp genetic material was detected beyond the two electric barriers, leaving only a single lock/dam on the Calumet River between the detected presence and Lake Michigan. Many citizens called for an immediate closing of the lock, though others doubted that it was feasible to stop shipping traffic.

In the first week of December 2009, the Army Corps made plans to shut down one of the electric barriers for maintenance, and the Illinois Department of Natural Resources responded by dumping 2,200 gallons of the toxin Rotenone into the canal. While scores of fish were killed, only one carp was found – nearly six miles below the electronic barriers. The fish kill cost \$3 million and produced 90 tons of dead fish.

In December 2009 the Michigan State Attorney General filed a lawsuit with the U. S. Supreme Court seeking the immediate closure of the Chicago Sanitary and Ship Canal to keep the Asian Carp out of Lake Michigan. Neighboring Great Lakes states and the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, which constructed the Canal, are codefendants in the lawsuit. In response, the Illinois State Attorney General filed a counter-suit requesting that the Court reject Michigan's claims. Siding with the State of Illinois, the Illinois Chamber of Commerce and the American Waterways Operators have filed affidavits arguing that closing the Chicago Sanitary and Ship Canal would upset the movement of millions of tons of vital shipments of iron ore, coal, grain and other cargo, totaling more than \$1.5 billion a year, and contribute to the loss of hundreds, perhaps thousands of jobs.

In January 2010 the U. S. Supreme Court rejected the Michigan injunction request. Further steps are being taken by concerned governmental and citizen groups to pressure Congress to permanently sever the man-made link between the Great Lakes and the Mississippi River. According to the EPA, this would mean reconfiguring some 70 miles of canals and rivers and would be a massive undertaking that could not happen quickly. Other options are also being considered, including building another electric barrier and stepping up efforts to find and kill fish that may have slipped through. The Asian carp are still a major threat to the Great Lakes to which no immediate solution has been found.

Update on Pentwater's Waste Water Treatment Facility

The Village of Pentwater is working with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and Environment (MDNRE) to determine what type of wastewater treatment system will best meet the needs of the Village. A decision on what direction the village will take is pending and should be decided in April of 2010.

Boardwalk Project Needs Funding

The Pentwater Downtown Development Authority (PDDA) has submitted grant applications to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and Environment and to Coastal Zone Management to secure funding for a proposed boardwalk that would extend between Charlie's Marina and Snug Harbor. If funding can be obtained, the project is projected to be completed in 2012.

The Fishing Pier is Ready for Use

The new fishing pier located at the end of Fourth Street will be ready for use this spring. The tentative date to install the fishing pier is the week of April 12th. Decisions will be made about the exact location of the dingy dock once the pier is in place and space requirements can be assessed.



New Appearance Ordinance

The Downtown Development Authority (DDA) has created a committee to oversee the changes in facades of business sites within the Village. The committee is currently developing voluntary guidelines for businesses to follow regarding facade types and paint color. A meeting with the committee will be mandatory and linked to acquiring a zoning permit. The guidelines are not mandatory but the DDA hopes that businesses will follow the recommendations of the committee.

The owners of Silver Hills Antiques will be sponsoring an Antique Appraisal Fair on the Village Green in Pentwater on Saturday, July 31, 2010. Pentwater's Artist Palette

Our Continuing Series on Pentwater Artists...by Norma Oly

Anyone who knows PLA member Beverly Kelly knows that she loves weaving baskets and teaching the art as well. "Basketry or basket making is *such* a creative process," she says, "because although several students may choose to work on the same basketry pattern, each basket really turns out to be a one-of-a-kind item." That's because students select the size, shape and color of the reed they want to use and just by changing one item, each basket will take on its own design.

Bev uses many pliable and natural materials when teaching basket weaving classes at the Pentwater Artisan's Center on Park Street. Huge bags of various colors of flat or curved reed, sea grasses, pine straw, twine and wooden bases grace the large open shelves of her classroom. "I love all the room we have to work in," smiles Bev. Each Thursday afternoon about a dozen men and women can be seen weaving totally different types of baskets, large and small, in the upstairs room of the Center. Most are standing up while they work, and their beautiful wicker, coiled and plaited baskets are beginning to take shape in all different sizes and patterns.

"People have been creating baskets for centuries," Bev explained, "and the process is basically the same. Students begin with a woven or wooden base (holes also have to be drilled for attaching the reed spokes) and then lay on the stakes using various materials to weave or fill in the sides. Edges or rims also have to be finished, and the process can take three to four hours for a small basket and of course much, much longer for larger pieces."

mother of four boys had been busy setting up a day treatment program for severely emotional impaired students, "and that is when I decided that I definitely needed a new

outlet!" she stated with a grin. It was at a staff event that she first met juried artist and basketmaker, Rita Hogan, and Bev began taking classes from her once each week. "I still have over sixty baskets that I have kept," she says, and with a smile continues, "but I have a special attachment to each one and I have a hard time selling them." She has also made many as gifts for family and friends, and has created doll cradles, square napkin and round roll baskets, as well as many which she uses for special holidays and home decorating.

Teaching basketry classes comes naturally to Bev, who recently retired after thirty-one years as an educator.

After graduating from Eastern Michigan University, she taught literature and government to middle school students in West Bloomfield and Dearborn, eventually obtaining her Master's degree in Learning Disabilities from Oakland University. When husband Dan took a position as a middle school principal in Flint township, Bev soon followed to teach in the special education program. Having obtained her endorsement in teaching the emotionally impaired, she was asked to set up a new day treatment center for the school district, and basketweaving became her passion.



Although the Kellys were originally from the eastern side of the state, they have been coming to Ludington and the lake shore area during summer vacations since their children were small. "We'd take rides through Bass Lake and Pentwater and Dan, an avid outdoorsman, fell in love with the area that had a river, a lake and Lake Michigan all in one location," says Bev. The couple eventually bought a house in Apache Hills, and "from 1987 until 2006 we were weekenders and summer people," she explained. Since their retirement, Dan and Bev have become members of the PLA and Dan is also Vice President of the Service Club. Bev currently serves as the President of the Women's Club and chairs the Nurturing Committee at Centenary United Methodist Church. We are also grateful that she shares her art, her craft, and her teaching talent with us at the Artisan's Center every Thursday!

PLA Board Resolution re Wind Turbines in Lake Michigan

Upon recognizing the opinion of the vast majority of the Pentwater Lake Association membership regarding the proposed Aegir Wind Turbine Project in Lake Michigan off Pentwater, the Board of the Pentwater Lake Association has passed the following resolution:

We, the Board of Directors of the Pentwater Lake Association, are unanimously opposed to the Aegir Wind Turbine Project as proposed. We have concluded that the project is not an equitable solution to our energy needs as much as a trade off of one set of problems for another. Given that this project’s business plan is rooted in federal and state subsidies in order to provide electricity at competitive rates and is also based on the “taking” of Lake Michigan assets enjoyed by millions and held in public trust, for the benefit of a private enterprise, we believe the proposal is not a demonstration of progress in problem solving and is a poor tradeoff for our community.

Wind power does have potential for diversifying our energy supply in a minimally polluting manner, and therefore is considered an environmentally friendly or green energy source. But that certainly doesn’t mean that turning offshore Lake Michigan into an industrial zone, packing in large numbers of huge turbines so that our view is totally dominated by wind machines,

is green. We don’t drill or mine in national parks, we don’t drill off near-shore California or Florida, we resist turning the Sonoma Desert into one big solar array. We don’t allow industry to destroy our air or water quality anymore in the name of progress. We shouldn’t allow our views to be destroyed either. It can’t be considered environmentally friendly to sacrifice one of the finest undisturbed views left in this part of the world for either environmental or economic reasons. Economically, we can’t imagine that we would risk trading the reputation this stretch of coast has of broad beaches, outstanding views, and world-class sunsets for one of a possible tourist pariah. Just having the perception out there that this area is one to avoid could destroy one of our two economic mainstays. The economic benefits to the community from this project are highly unlikely to equal the economic risk and justify the environmental and aesthetic loss we would face.

We do need to strongly pursue alternative energy options, but that doesn’t mean we have to accept every one that comes along with a green or sustainable label. We owe it to ourselves to be picky and careful, and to not jump on a bandwagon leading to regret.

Pentwater's New Safety System

The Village of Pentwater received a stimulus grant from the federal government to purchase equipment for the Pentwater Public Video System. The system includes five video cameras designed to provide information to law enforcement should a serious accident or suspicious incident occur within the Village. The five new unmonitored cameras are mounted on the Village Hall. One camera is focused on the channel and rotates 360 degrees to provide a panoramic view, a second on the marina and fishing pier area, a third on the entry area to the township offices, and the fourth and fifth will scan north and south on Hancock Street.



See the two dots where the arrow is pointing. These are the cameras that focus north & south on Hancock.

These cameras will be unmonitored and videos will only be looked at if information is needed regarding an accident or suspicious event. A committee of five individuals has been organized and is in the process

of drafting a policy for how the system will function, what the cameras will monitor, and when and how the video clips will be viewed. This committee has developed a survey to obtain community input. The survey is available at the U.S. Post Office, *Cenzo's*, *Good Stuff*, *The Brown Bear*, and *The Antler Bar*.

ON THE AGENDA

The board of the Pentwater Lake Association meets on the third Tuesday of each month at 7:00 pm at the Village Hall. The meetings are always open to our members.

January 19 The Board discussed various issues including the search for a new editor for the newsletter, the need to monitor the offshore wind turbine proposal, the possible invasion of Asian carp into Lake Michigan. Payment of \$100 for renewal of the Association's membership in the Michigan Waterfront Alliance was approved.

February 18 Denny Powers of the Oceana County Board of Commissioners was present to listen to and participate in discussion of the proposed offshore wind turbines. He advised that the County at that time had not taken a position because it had not received a proposal on which to act, but that they plan to listen to all sides of the issue and carefully consider the positives and negatives.

The PLA received a request for money from the Michigan Waterfront Alliance Legal Assistance Fund which has been established to provide funds for filing amicus briefs or taking other legal steps in matters relating to riparian rights. The board voted to send \$100 for this fund.

We have also received a request from Goeff Hansen for money to help pay for filing an amicus brief to seek closing the locks in Chicago to prevent Asian carp from entering the Great Lakes. The board voted to give \$500 for this purpose.

March 16 The Board again discussed the offshore wind turbine issue, and voted to take a position opposing the proposed installation (see page 7).

The annual Michigan Lake and Stream Associations spring conference is being held this year in Lansing on April 30-May 1. Board member Joe Primozich is planning to attend as our representative.

BOATERS' SAFETY CLASSES

1st class: June 10-11

2nd class: July 8-9

3rd class: August 9-10

All three classes will be at the Pentwater Yacht Club from 8 am to noon each day. Attendance on both days is required to meet the mandated eight hours of classroom instruction. The instructor will be Sheriff's Department Marine Office Tim Simon.

The classes are free; all costs are shared by the Sheriff's Department, the Pentwater Yacht Club and the Pentwater Sportsfishing Association. The classes are available to everyone, residents and visitors, 12 years of age or older.

A certificate showing completion of a boating safety class is required in Michigan for operators of personal watercraft who were born after 12/31/1978. Also, all youth 12 to 15 years of age are required to have completed a boating safety class to operate unaccompanied any boat powered by a motor of greater than six horsepower.

Please use Phosphorus Free Fertilizer

Excess nutrients can degrade freshwater quality. Phosphorus supplemented lawn fertilizers in particular have often been identified as a prime source of excess nutrients that may lead to algae blooms and/or explosive growth of aquatic plants in the lake.

In recent years, lawn care product companies have developed effective alternatives for riparians concerned about their lake ecosystems. Many of these products are now readily available at local retail outlets.
